GET IN THE GAME... FOR PROSTATE CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

One in seven men will be diagnosed with prostate cancer in his lifetime. The good news? Thanks to increased awareness, nearly 90% of all prostate cancers are detected in early stages – when the cure rate is very high. *In fact, almost 100% of men diagnosed with local or regional prostate cancer are disease-free five years later.*

The American Cancer Society advises most men to consider prostate cancer screening starting at age 50, though younger men at higher risk for developing the disease (such as African Americans and those with a family history of prostate cancer) may opt for earlier monitoring. Not all medical experts agree on screening recommendations. Therefore, it is important to talk to your doctor about the potential risks, benefits and uncertainties associated with prostate cancer screening before making an informed decision about testing.


In its earliest stages, prostate cancer may not produce any symptoms.

So the first step in detecting the disease is often a blood test and/or a digital rectal exam performed in your doctor's office.
